US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	<p>In California CDBG funds are allocated primarily through two methods, "Entitlement Communities" and "State Administered CDBG". Planning</li> </ol>	<p><b>State Administered CDBG</b>            Non-entitlement areas receive State Administered CDBG through the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). Non-entitlement areas are cities with populations of less than 50,000 (except cities that are designated principal cities of a MSA), and counties with populations of less than 200,000.</p> <p>Annually HCD develops funding priorities and criteria for selecting projects.
